



2027 Masters Men and Women

Date: February 24 to Feb 28, 2027 (Wednesday to Sunday)

Location: Amherst Curling Club

Registration Deadline: January 13, 2027 at 12:00 pm (noon)

Entry Fee: \$500.00

National Championship: April 5 to 11, 2027 at St. Vital Curling Club in Winnipeg April 4-11th, 2027

The Masters is not affiliated with Curling Canada. The Canadian Championship is administered by the National Masters Committee. The winning team earns the right to represent Nova Scotia at the Canadian Masters Curling Championship; all associated costs are the responsibility of the team.

This appendix is subject to review and evaluation, at a minimum, on an annual basis. The rules for one year's championship will not be construed to give or imply any right for future championships. The NS Curling policy is to publicize its rules in advance of the competition affected by those rules. Any mistakes, omissions or ambiguity may be subject to clarification by the Competition Advisory Panel. This appendix can be deemed final 14 days prior to the start of the championship.

See below for specific competition details. The rules and details contained in the main body of the Competition Guide apply to this competition. In the event there is a perceived conflict between the Competition Guide and this appendix, this appendix is considered first.

A. PARTICIPATION ELIGIBILITY

- 1) The provincial championship is a limited entry, no qualification event.
 - a) The Masters Men's Championship is limited to 16 teams, which will be based on a first come, first served to register for the event.
 - b) The Masters Women's Championship is limited to 16 teams, which will be based on a first come, first served to register for the event.
 - c) If a full complement of 16 teams is registered, teams may register to be placed on the waiting list.
- 2) Teams MUST register four (4) players. Teams may register an alternate and eligible coach. A team's registration will not be accepted if all four (4) players are not registered prior to the registration deadline.

- 4) All players and alternate must be:
 - a) Canadian citizens.
 - b) residents of Nova Scotia.
 - c) sixty (60) years of age or older on December 31, 2026.
 - d) a member in good standing of a NS Curling affiliated curling club but not necessarily the same club.

- 6) A delivery stick may be used.

B. HOSTING INFORMATION

- 1) A minimum of four (4) sheets of ice is required.
- 2) Club should be accessible.
- 3) The event is scheduled for a maximum of five (5) days.
- 4) Club stones will be used.
- 5) The event will be officiated.
- 6) Games will be timed.
- 7) There will be a pre-competition practice scheduled.
- 8) There will be a pre-game practice prior to each draw.
- 9) House buttons should be the same size with triangulation measurement points established.
- 10) No opening ceremony.
- 11) Games will have live scoring on the NS Curling website.

C. UMPIRES

Once the competition starts, the Chief Umpire has the general supervision and governance of the rules and procedures. The Chief Umpire shall have full authority to enforce the rules of the game as adopted by NS Curling. The decision of the Chief Umpire is final in all aspects involving judgment calls. In emergency situations, the Chief Umpire may have to act immediately in areas outside of rules, policy or precedent. In these situations, the Chief Umpire is the final authority.

The Chief Umpire may intervene at any time and give directions to any player or coach. They may suspend or expel a player or coach for abusive or unacceptable behavior, including bad language. All conduct matters will be fully documented and filed with NS Curling for subsequent review and follow-up. For more information regarding officiating consult [Competition Guide, Section 9.2.](#)

D. COACHING STANDARD

- 1) Only coaches meeting the required coaching credential standards will be permitted on-ice access. No exemptions to certification standards will be provided.

F. PROVINCIAL CHAMPIONSHIP

GENERAL

- 1) This championship is a designated Tier 2 NS Curling event.
- 2) The WCF moratorium on brush heads is in effect, and the exchanging of brooms and changing brush heads during play will not be allowed. For more information on equipment consult [Competition Guide, Sections 10.1-10.2](#).
- 3) Umpires will conduct all measurements.
- 4) Players and coaches cannot be in the ice shed at any time during the event without an Umpire present who has been assigned to and is working the event.
- 5) In the event of a Force Majeure and the provincial championship is not able to be held, all entry fees will be refunded. The selection of the team to represent NS at the Canadian Championship will be governed by the Competitions Advisory Panel.

COMPETITION FORMAT IN THE QUALIFYING ROUND

- 1) The anticipated format is round robin pool play.
- 2) The number of participating teams will determine:
 - a) If teams are divided into one (1) or more pools.
 - b) The number of teams qualifying for playoffs.
 - c) NS Curling reserves the right to modify the draw format to meet the requirements of the championship.
- 3) Each game is scheduled for eight (8) ends.
- 4) Teams may play a maximum of three (3) games per day; however, three (3) game days cannot be scheduled for two (2) consecutive days, excluding playoffs.
- 5) The official draw and schedule will be emailed to the primary team contact.

RANKING & DRAW PLACEMENT PROCEDURE

- 1) Self-Seeding (peer ranking) will be used. Teams will be placed into the draw based on the results of the ballots received.

GAME TIMING

- 1) Games will be timed. However, certain compromises could be made depending upon club space, available equipment, number of volunteers, etc.
- 2) Each team shall receive 32 minutes of thinking time; extra ends are four minutes and thirty seconds (4:30).
- 3) The mid-game break is five (5) minutes.
- 4) There will be a three (3) minute break before starting an extra end. Between all other ends, breaks will be “turn and go”.
- 5) Each team will receive one (1) sixty (60) second time out per 8-end game. Each team will receive one (1) sixty (60) second time out during any extra end of play.

PRE-COMPETITION PRACTICE

- 1) There will be a pre-competition practice scheduled.
- 2) Teams are not required to participate. As a matter of courtesy please let the Competition Advisory Panel know if you are not going to attend your practice session.
- 3) Teams are NOT permitted to practice at the host club within 24 hours of the start of competition, unless they are a regular member of the club with a regularly scheduled game during that 24-hour period.

PRE-GAME CALL

- 1) Thirty (30) minutes prior to the scheduled game time, when announced, teams will report to the designated pre-game area to:
 - a) confirm their line-up and readiness to play.
 - b) name which player will be throwing the LSD clockwise rotation, and which player will be throwing the LSD counter-clockwise rotation.
 - c) receive any instructions.

- 3) A draw to the button competition will be used to determine the last stone advantage in the first end.

PRE-GAME PRACTICE

- 1) Twenty-five (25) minutes prior to scheduled game time, first practice will be announced.
- 2) It will consist of up to one (1) minute of slider cool-down with sliding, seven (7) minutes of practice time with a one (1) minute remaining warning, then, a one (1) minute time period for each Last Stone Draw. Second practice will follow the same format. Please follow the Umpire’s announcements.
- 3) Pre-game practice is not mandatory, but the team’s attendance is required for Last Stone Draw.
- 4) Coaches and alternates are allowed access on the ice surface during practices, with appropriate curling footwear.

LAST STONE DRAW (LSD) IN THE QUALIFYING ROUND

- 1) Last stone advantage in the first end will be decided by a draw to the button contest immediately following the pre-game practice.
- 2) Under the direction of the umpire, teams will deliver two (2) LSDs. The first LSD will be thrown in the clockwise rotation; the second LSD will be thrown in the counter-clockwise rotation.
- 3) Each player will deliver an equal number of clockwise and counter-clockwise LSD stones. If

there are an odd number of games, a variation of one rotation per player must occur.

TEAM RANKING AND PLAYOFF PROCESS

- 1) The Chief Umpire will make all decisions with regard to the administration of playoff games.
- 2) Playoff teams will be ranked and placed into the playoff draw according to their qualifying round results.
- 3) There will be NO tiebreaker games scheduled.
- 4) Immediately following the conclusion of the qualifying round final draw, a meeting may occur between the Chief Umpire and all playoff teams. Teams must send one (1) team member (i.e. player or coach).
 - a) The Chief Umpire will identify each team's advantages and choices with respect to hammer, handle color selection, and any adjustments to scheduling or ice assignments.
 - b) A team that does not attend the playoff meeting forfeits their game choices (last stone advantage in first end, stone handle color, and practice order) to which the team may be entitled.
